WHEREAS, there are more than 900,000 law enforcement officers serving in communities across the United States, including the dedicated members of all law enforcement agencies in Jackson County; and

WHEREAS, over 60,200 assaults against law enforcement officers are reported each year, resulting in over 17,400 injuries; and

WHEREAS, since the first recorded death in 1791, more than 21,000 law enforcement officers in the United States have made the ultimate sacrifice and been killed in the line of duty, including members of law enforcement in Jackson County; and

WHEREAS, the names of these dedicated public servants are engraved on the walls of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C.; and

WHEREAS, 307 new names of fallen heroes are being added to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial this spring, including 287 officers killed in 2019; and

WHEREAS, the service and sacrifice of all officers killed in the line of duty will be honored during the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund's 32nd Annual Candlelight Vigil, on the evening of May 13, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Candlelight Vigil is part of National Police Week, which takes place this year on May 10-16; and

WHEREAS, May 12th is designated as Peace Officers Memorial Day, in honor of all fallen officers and their families and U.S. flags should be flown at half-staff.

Now Therefore,

The Board of Commissioners of Jackson County proclaims May 10-16, 2020, as Police Week in Jackson County, Oregon, and publicly salutes the service of law enforcement officers in our community and in communities across the nation.
